The last two weeks have seen our Year 12 students fully engaged in their Trial HSC examinations. It is pleasing to see how far these students have progressed in their time at Murray High School. Some of the practical subjects have already been submitted for marking, allowing students to focus on their preparations for their forthcoming HSC exams. It is timely to remind all parents of the availability of the Library, Monday through to Thursday after school, for students. This is a supervised space where students of all years can

focus on assessment tasks, homework or to study for upcoming exams.

Congratulations must go to the students who entered works in the inaugural Director's Acquisitive Art Prize. There were several categories and the winning piece has been purchased as part of a permanent collection. Three Murray High School students made the finals and their works have been on display at the Albury Education Offices. These students were Manu Masaudi, Sophie Collins and Regan Buchanan.

Recently we had a visit from one of Murray High School's Hall of Fame ex-students. Lauren Jackson visited the school as a part of the filming of a documentary for Fox Sports. Lauren had many positive reminiscences of her time at Murray High. She even identified one of her best memories as being a part of the of the Murray High School senior basketball 'Dream Team' of 1996, which went on to be NSW CHS Champions.



A quick note to thank Mrs Edgar for the

outstanding work that she is doing with facilitating future career pathways for MHS students. Three of our HSC students have already been offered places in the new Diploma of Sports Management Program through the Richmond Institute of Sport. Whilst it is early days in terms of whether they will accept the positions, it is gratifying to know that they have many options on the table for their future. I encourage all parents to advise their children to make contact with Mrs Edgar to seek out current information on career pathways. The changing nature of the current workforce means that there are opportunities arising all the time which Mrs Edgar can assist students to access.

Communication between parents

Food Choices

Murray High School is a healthy choices canteen school. This acknowledges the importance of healthy nutrition for all children, and also acknowledges that some foods can have a detrimental effect on students' health and learning. For that reason, high caffeine or sugar drinks and lollies or junk food are not to be brought into the school. These will be taken off students. If you are aware that your child purchases these items on their way to school, please talk to them to ensure that they do not do so in future. Each morning all students are to enter the school directly and stay within the school grounds. Bus travellers must enter the school grounds upon exiting the bus.

Year 12 Attendance Policy Reminder

This is a reminder of the Year 12 Attendance Policy. A copy of this has been published in previous newsletters and can also be found in the 2017-2018 Year 12 Assessment Booklet.

The school acknowledges the crucial importance of attending lessons in maximising student achievement in the Higher School Certificate. In order to emphasise the importance of attendance as a basic responsibility of students, the school has a minimum attendance requirement of eighty percent (80%) for Year 12 students to be given the privilege of attending the school's Year 12 Formal.

The cut-off of eighty percent attendance applies to unexplained absences. Absences which are explained, such as school excursions and school representative sport will not count as unexplained absences. Absences for which medical certificates have been supplied specifically stating the relevant dates also will not count as unexplained absences.

The cut-off date by which the minimum requirement of 80% attendance will be assessed is the Monday, 10th of September (Week 8, Term 3).

If a Year 12 student has purchased a Year 12 Formal ticket, but is not permitted to attend because their attendance is below eighty percent, they will be entitled to a refund for the price of their ticket on application to the school.

The person with responsibility for this Year 12 Attendance Policy will be the Deputy Principal responsible for Year 12, Mr Daryl Brownlaw.

ADDITIONAL SUPPORT FOR STUDENTS COMPLETING THE PRELIMINARY AND HSC COURSES.

Students undertaking the Preliminary and Higher School Certificate are able to be given some additional support and provisions that could assist them in completing exams and assessment tasks to the very best of their ability. The Board of Studies encourages eligible students to make use of this support during their preliminary course so that when the HSC examinations begin they are familiar with the process and are given every opportunity to show the Board of Studies what they know.

There is a range of provisions that can be allocated to a student based on learning, medical, vision or hearing difficulties. An application is lodged by the school, on behalf of the student, for these provisions from term 4, the year before their HSC. We are able to provide provisions at a school level from Year 11 onwards. These provisions will be provided for all school based assessment tasks and examinations.

Many students that are eligible for provisions maybe known to staff, but other students are encouraged to ask if they think they meet the criteria on the list attached. Students are to see Mrs McNamara if they think they may be eligible and would like to access these provisions. Parents are welcome to contact Mrs McNamara or Ms Glass on 60254711 if they have any questions.

Murray High School and the Board of Studies support students in doing their best in their Preliminary and HSC years and will offer as much support as they are eligible for.

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HEADLICE

The facts

- head lice are one of the most commonly reported health complaints from parents and teachers ٠
- anyone can catch head lice regardless of their age, sex, or how clean their hair is
- head lice move from one person's head to another via direct contact with the hair
- head lice do not survive long when they are off a human head
- head lice do not live on furniture, hats, bedding or carpet
- head lice have built up some resistance to head lice treatments

Treatment


There are two main treatment options to remove head lice:

Mechanical removal or 'comb and conditioner' method

What you need for this method:

- Normal comb to detangle hair prior to using metal lice comb
- Fine toothed metal lice comb (available from your local chemist or online)
- Conditioner buy a cheap brand as you will be needing a lot of it, and preferably one that is white to make spotting the lice easier
- White paper towel

Mechanical removal involves applying conditioner to dry hair. Cover all of the hair with conditioner, detangle hair with normal comb and separate into sections. Then, using a fine long toothed metal lice comb, comb through the hair in sections. The conditioner does not kill lice but stuns them for about 20 minutes enabling easier removal. The long toothed metal comb will remove nits and the stunned head lice. Wipe the comb on a white tissue and check for any lice or nits. Keep combing until no more appear on the tissue. This method should be done every second or third day until no nits and lice remain, usually about 7 to 10 days. Please see the explanation below for more detailed guidance.



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This method is the preferred way to detect and treat head lice because it is effective, does not contribute to insecticide resistance in head lice and also presents a low risk of skin irritation.

This method also helps manage head lice before they become established on the head. Simply keep a good head lice comb in the shower and every time your family washes their hair use the fine comb through the hair. This will ensure lice are "caught" before they lay too many eggs. Your children are old enough to wash their own hair so encourage them to use the comb themselves. Or keep a comb handy to where you wash your children's hair and use it every shampoo.

Chemical removal

What you need for this method:

- Normal comb to detangle hair prior to using metal lice comb
- Chemical treatment containing synthetic or natural insecticides that kill head lice (talk to your local pharmacist to identify the treatments containing insecticides)
- Fine toothed metal lice comb (available from your local chemist or online)
- White paper towel

Before you choose a treatment for head lice, consider the following:

- Registered chemical treatments that contain insecticides to kill lice are usually safe, but excessive use of other substances, such as home remedies and other insecticides, can cause irritation. Speak to your local pharmacist to identify the registered treatments that are safe for you and your child.
- Always read the product label before applying and use as directed.
- Natural products like tea tree oil are not recommended. If you don't want to use chemical treatment, use the mechanical removal described above.
- Do not use methylated spirits or kerosene on your child's head.
- Avoid treating babies with chemical treatment.
- Avoid chemical treatment on any scalp that is irritated or inflamed.
- Protect children's eyes when treating with any product.
- There is no preventative treatment available for head lice. Treating the whole family with chemical treatment as a precaution contributes to head lice becoming resistant to the products used.

NSW Health does not recommend excluding children with head lice from school due to the following reasons:

- Head lice are not known to transmit diseases.
- Exclusion from school or childcare is not an effective way of breaking the cycle of head lice infestations.

Sport Report



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School Sport

The DET requirements related to mandatory weekly participation in sport and physical activity for schools and their students. Students in Years K-10 must participate in a minimum of 150 minutes of planned moderate with some vigorous physical activity across the school week. This time includes planned weekly sport. MHS policy states that students must attend sport. If students are sick or injured, they can attend non-sport where they are able to complete homework or other school related tasks. There are also options for students to assist as officials and referees at their sport so that they are engaging with the sport program.

Keeping your children safe when dropping off and picking up at school

Here are a few things you can do to help keep your children and others safer during drop-off and pick-up times during the school week:

- Make sure your children are fastened in the correct child car seat for their age and size and that it is fitted correctly.
- Stick to the 40km/h speed limit in a school zone and look out for children who may be about.
- Watch for flashing lights on buses. They let you know that there may be children crossing or about to cross the road. A 40km/h limit applies when school bus lights flash.
- Always give way to pedestrians particularly when entering and leaving driveways.
- Always park and turn legally around schools. Manoeuvres such as U-turns and three-point turns are dangerous during busy school drop-off and pick-up times.
- Drop your children off and pick them up on the school side of the road in your school's designated drop-off and pick-up area. Never call out to them from across the road – they may run to you without checking for traffic.
- It's safest for children to get out of the car through the Safety Door, away from passing traffic. This is the rear footpath side door of the car.
